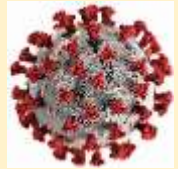


Introduction

Public Health

ACHIEVEMENTS



Key Actions achieved this week:

- Celebration e-zine launched to acknowledge the work of Somerset Schools in supporting the health and wellbeing of children and young people. The e-zine was read by 233 people on its launch day.

- Business forums, Chambers of commerce etc have been engaged by the SCC PH team, to remind them how to prevent outbreaks and how to respond to individual cases.
- Somerset leading regional work around messages for the tourism sector working with best practice network (LGA) - materials cascaded across sector.

Domestic abuse

- Total 'Somerset Survivors' website hits (since April to now) – 10,225. This time last year (when there wasn't a campaign running, there were 1,922 hits)
- 5,105 of which are direct (ie they searched the exact Somerset Survivors website)
- 2,200 of total hits came via Facebook banner link (13 last year!)
- 1,820 were organic searches ie – key words used ie 'Somerset domestic abuse'

Testing:

656 people tested at Taunton racecourse
241 people tested at mobile testing units (Street, Yeovilton, Minehead)
964 arranged home tests for covid19

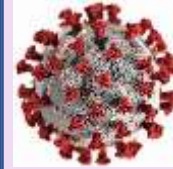

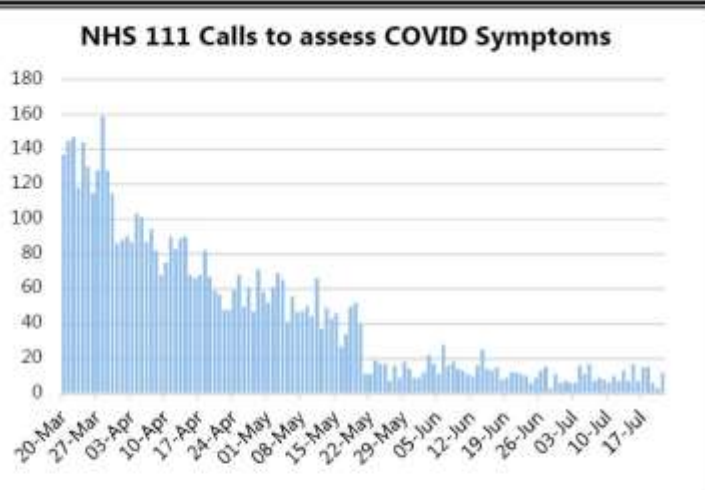

NHS 111 COVID Demand



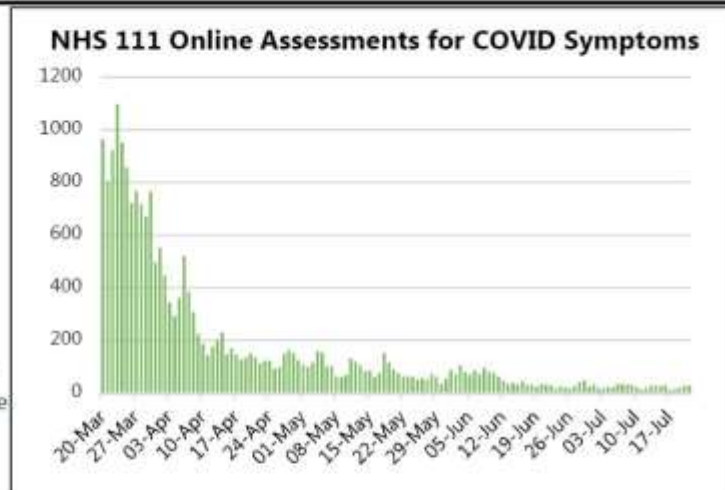
Latest daily Somerset based calls to NHS 111 to assess COVID symptoms

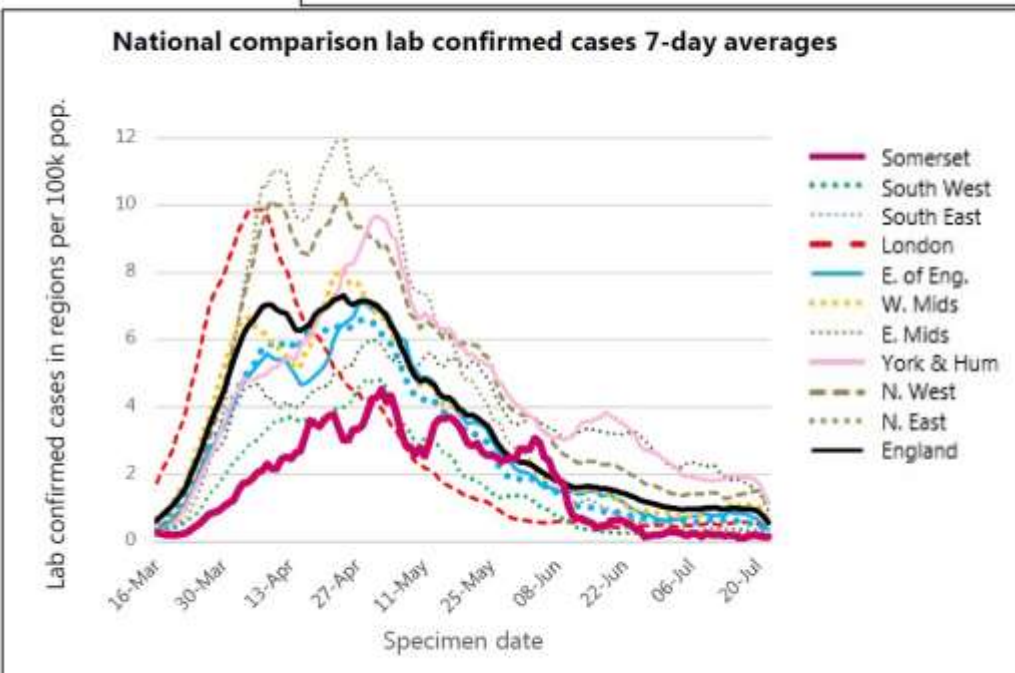
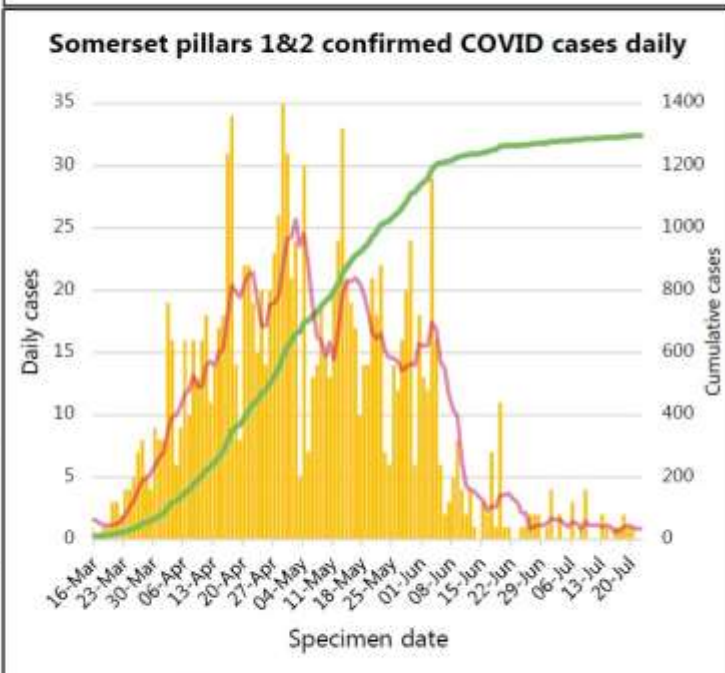


Detected cases

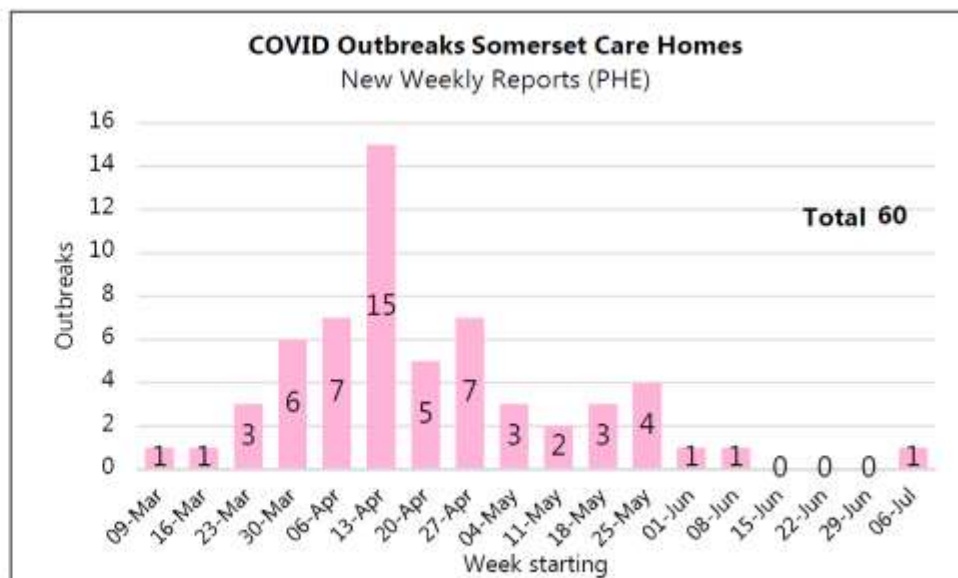
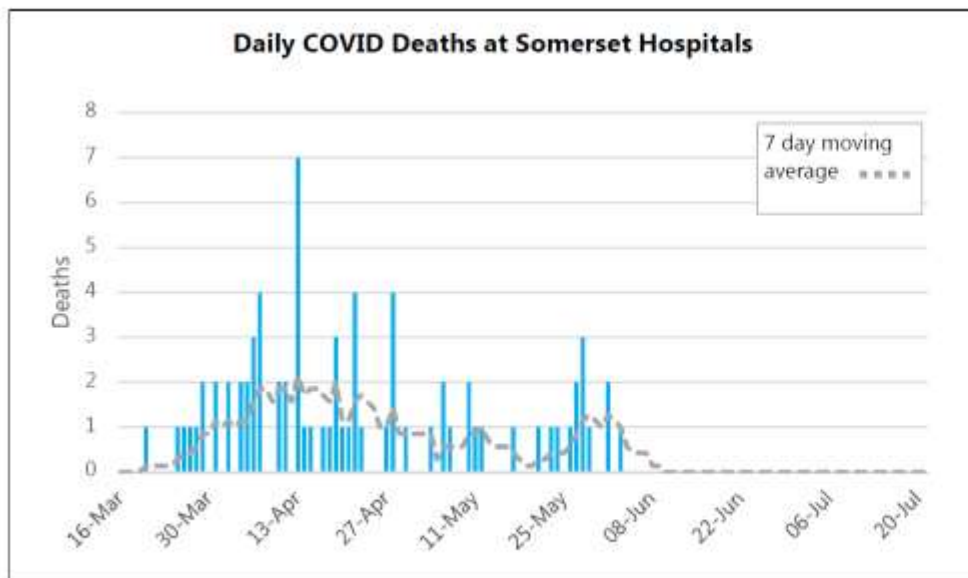

An R number of 1 means that on average every person who is infected will infect 1 other person, meaning the total number of new infections is stable.

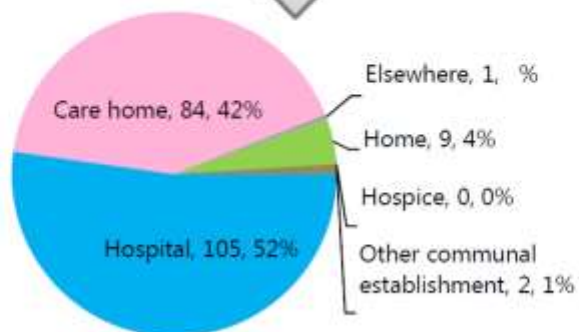

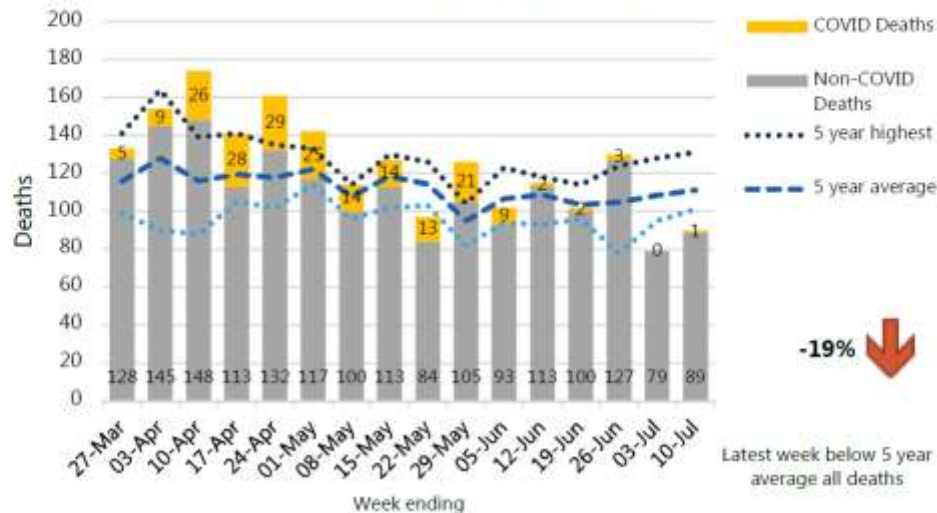

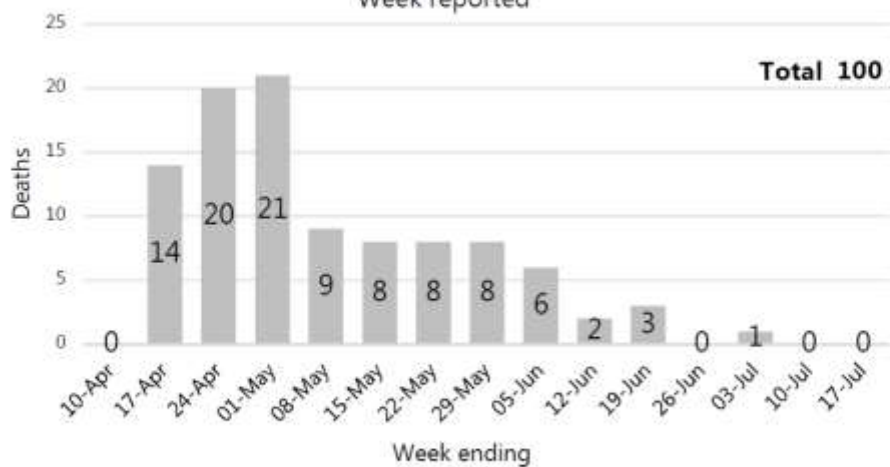


Somerset All Deaths (weekly) (ONS)

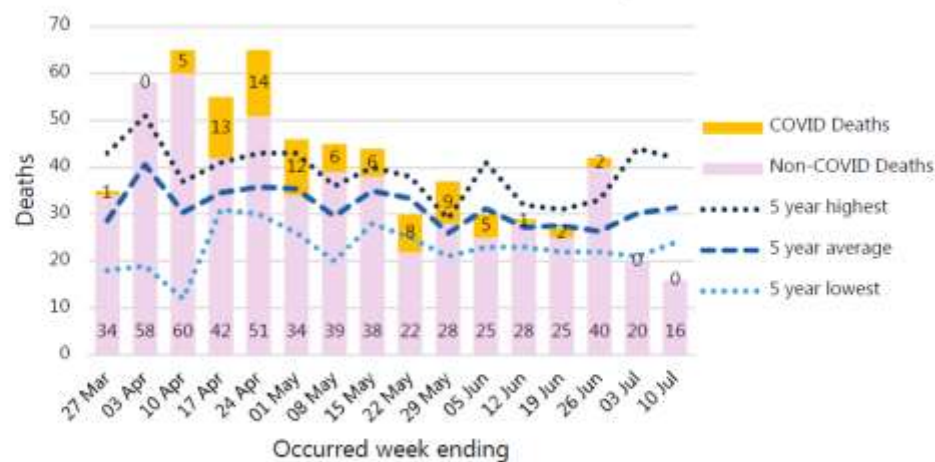

Community & Resilience Cell

Key Points *(figures correct as of 22nd July)*

- 7207 calls have now been made to the **Somerset Coronavirus Support Helpline**. The Helpline will remain open to support: the new Local Outbreak Management Plan; Coronavirus restrictions being lifted; residents coming off shielded arrangements; and preparedness for any potential spikes in the Somerset numbers.
- The DEFRA Supermarket Priority slot process went live this week.
- National Shielding Support to extremely vulnerable people will cease at the end of July.
- A letter as part of the "We are undefeatable" campaign has been sent this week to Shielding people in Somerset to promote the campaign and to share resources that have been prepared to support people with long-term conditions to be physically active and healthy at home.
- Spark Somerset have recently filled the 2 additional posts funded by SCC and CCG to enhance Spark's ability to support the VCSE sector. The posts will focus on funding and community development.
- The Somerset Coronavirus local appeal has now awarded a significant milestone of £500k and phase two grants are now available to help communities recover from the impact of the coronavirus outbreak.
- Money Advice videos have been produced and are hosted on Citizens Advice South Somerset's webpages <https://www.citizensadviceSouthSomerset.org.uk/advice/>
- Mindline has seen its highest number of callers in any week since we started the 24/7 service at 487 calls. The line is working well to link people with additional services if needed. We continue to promote the service along with the Bereavement Support service. A new simple guide to mental health support has been distributed via the Village Agents. Promoting wellbeing activities across communities and organisations continues to be a priority.

Actions going forward

- To consider impact on those who were shielding in light of Government stepping down this programme.
- Progressing programme of food and activities to families across Summer Holidays.
- To begin forming an exit strategy for the Community Distribution Hubs
- To develop a plan of key milestones as we work towards stabilisation and recovery

Active Travel Cell

Key points & next steps (as of 23rd July)

- The cell reviewed a preliminary list of schemes to submit for the 2nd Tranche of funding from the Department for Transport. The cell acknowledge a number of actions that will need to be completed
- Positive feedback continues to be received via our Somerset Commonplace site with 55% of respondents supporting the temporary measures that have been put in place. Numbers of visitors to the site have been rising and we have several subscribers which we will be creating some communications to send regarding amendments to Tranche 1 schemes.

Economic Response & Recovery

Key points

- *Business Intelligence** – Business intelligence group provides evidence to support response and recovery, gathered from district partners, business representative organisations, local and national surveys, national statistics and expert organisations and think tanks.
 - The latest Somerset Bulletin on the Economic Impact of COVID-19 (Coronavirus) is available online** at: www.somersetrends.org.uk/covid-19-bulletins - includes latest labour market data released on 16th July, as well as data on uptake of furloughing and self-employment support schemes.
 - Feeding headline business issues (incl. challenges relating to Govt financial support)
 - Oxford Economics preparing economic projections/scenarios on COVID impact and recovery for Somerset and the wider region – SCC feedback on draft report given and awaiting final version.
 - Somerset business survey is being prepared on the economic impacts of COVID and sentiments/plans regarding recovery <https://somersetnewsroom.com/2020/07/24/understanding-the-business-impacts-of-coronavirus-in-somerset/>
- * Small Business Grant Fund As of the 19th of July, 10,983 grants have now been awarded, with circa 85.1% of eligible claims processed and 86.4% of total funding now distributed.** District colleagues report that this figure is unlikely to reach 100% however, with some districts reporting 0 claims for the first time this week since the launch of the scheme.
- The new discretionary grants scheme has been launched across the districts, with circa 1080 applications, although a significant number (circa 360) have been rejected due to ineligibility. Much of this funding from the discretionary grant pot has now been distributed across districts.
- * Local Solutions to Gaps In Local Support for Business**
- Working with partners to identify gaps in support and any vulnerabilities in local business support infrastructure – a phased programme of activity will be launched under the Business Rates Retention Scheme – a scheme for clusters/peer networks has just launched offering grants to establish/grow networks.** Has been a good response so far with a mix of local and strategic applications; closing date is 31 July. Additional support will be phased over the coming months to supplement Growth Hub support and respond to local need.
 - Somerset's Skill Up Service supplying general and bespoke advice to employers on managing their apprentices and other training needs as their businesses diversify to reflect need.**
- * Employment/Self Employment**
- Interventions, under the Business Rates Retention scheme, are being developed to provide a holistic package of employment and skills support to both business and individuals. This will include, but is not limited to, development of an online "hub", support to individuals impacted, mentoring for Not in Education, Employment or Training (NEETs), recruitment/skills fairs, establishment of employment hubs.**

It is anticipated that the online Hub will be developed and launched during August followed by local employment hubs

- Comms** – Action marketing plan, working on a campaign about shopping locally and promoting the business webinar public and Somerset Local Outbreak Management Plan messaging.
- Recovery plan – stakeholder engagement, building of evidence and prioritisation of projects and programmes proposed

Somerset Multi-agency Recovery Coordination Group (MARCG)

The group will bring partners together to maximise **collaboration**, understand impact and deliver recovery activity whilst sustaining necessary response activity

This week: Position Statement approved and adopted

- Sets out the position on:

 - Public health impacts
 - Impact on people and communities
 - Challenges for the tourism sector
 - Status of the labour market
 - Will include trends over time and graphical representations / infographics
- Key activity that will be prioritised and carried out includes:
 - Horizon scanning
 - Capture and review of risks and opportunities
 - Links to Local Outbreak Management Plan and joint comms between MARCG and Health Protection Board
 - Community engagement
 - Review multi-agency plans to ensure fitness for purpose
 - Production of a Recovery Strategy
 - Production of an impact assessment
- Will be maintained as a live document and updated each month
- A key principle to keep things simple and focussed on benefits for residents, businesses & communities
- Will be made available to partners as soon as final changes have been made

Coming up / next steps

- Set up data and intelligence group to support multi-agency recovery needs
- Finalise impact assessment

Somerset Waste Partnership



- Recycling centres are now, to all intents and purposes, back to business as usual and accepting all materials (except for reuse – which we are still working on). Usage is roughly 75% of what we would expect at this time of year and queues and waiting times have been manageable. 'Shop style' social distancing is working well, and visitors are still limited to a maximum of two per car and should wear gloves when outside their vehicle.
- Whilst all kerbside services are running and many data/systems issues have still been addressed, the garden waste service is still underperforming. A recovery plan is in place to improve this and all kerbside services and SWP are closely monitoring Suez against this. This week over 9,000 garden waste service subscribers have been written to directly, providing them with a new collection day, or confirm the existing collection day. The success of this should ease pressures across collections and see improvements across the board, including in Customer Services.
- Next week
 - The garden waste service rerouting will start next Monday (6 July).
 - Further additional resources to assist in the clearing the backlog of customer enquiries.
 - Planning for the restart of Recycle More continues, acknowledging the challenges currently being faced and the need to have a stable, high-performing service before committing to such a large-scale service change.

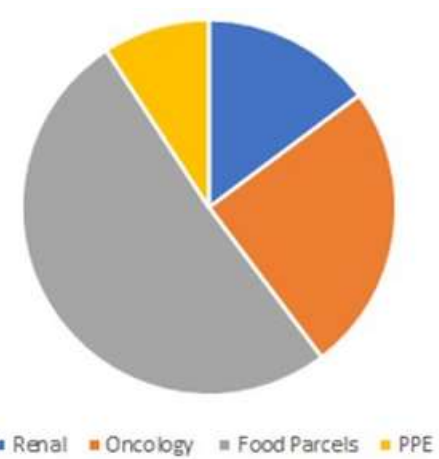

Health and Social Care

Key points

- **PPE is being moved to a chargeable model**
- Progress being made for **Care Homes to register to receive whole home testing**
- **Infection Control grant** return has been completed and sent back to central government to confirm how the monies have been distributed and spent by care providers in the County
- Finance have **paid the full amount of the grant** to the home care and supported living. Further tranche due to care home sector
- Regional and local care sector audit underway
- **Provider briefing** issued 20 July and includes updates on the PPE charging model.

- Work with Providers to share good news stories
- Whole home testing will be expanded to all care homes

Vulnerable Children

Key Points

- Increase in young people's anti-social behaviour and related issues has been noted across partners and is being explored
- Potential increase in complexity of need, particularly in mental health, is being explored further
- Work will continue with all schools (including Independent Non-Maintained) and social care over the summer holiday period to encourage the return of all children (and in particular vulnerable children) for September 2020
- Risk assessment process in place to support learners with EHC Plan to return to school
- Laptops for Disadvantaged Year 10 learners rolled out
- TEENS Multi-Agency work – 300 young people identified who would benefit from this service, additional funding being sought to support this work
- Slight rise in Children Looked After numbers compared to June 2019. No clear pattern emerging. Audits & data analysis continue in order to identify any emerging themes
- Safeguarding concerns around families living in isolation under increasing pressure and amid expected rise in domestic abuse and substance misuse incidents
- Impact of delays to Birth Registration process being monitored
- A £600k funding injection over three years from Somerset County Council and some great partnership working means more vulnerable families in Somerset will receive the help and support they need. The Somerset Early Help Fund has been launched and promoted by the Somerset Community Foundation in partnership with the County Council. <https://somersexnewsroom.com/2020/07/22/funding-means-more-of-the-right-help-at-the-right-time-for-families/>

Successes

- Additional foster care enquiries & assessments generated through adapted processes
- LA link officers established for schools and EY settings to provide single points of contact
- Successful alternative solutions provided for supporting vulnerable families for respite (Outdoor Education Centres)
- Improved monitoring and reporting of attendance across all schools
- Embedding of Multi-Agency Linked Professional safeguarding approach
- Delivery of an average of 1,000 Free School Meal boxes / week to schools
- Establishment of multi-agency universal and targeted support offer for vulnerable teenagers over the summer holiday period, supported by weekly multi-agency panel
- Summer holiday Free School Meal vouchers – vouchers for local shops to be made available, or Village Agents to support
- 4 tonnes of food per week secured from FareShare – partnership working in place with voluntary organisations & partners to link summer holiday activities for vulnerable families

Key Risks

- Increased safeguarding risks to vulnerable children during lockdown and expected rise in referrals as lockdown ends
- Increase in anti-social behaviour and complex needs is beginning to emerge
- Lack of available childcare for working families over the summer holiday period

Actions Going Forward

- Service needs to be established in relation to a partial return to office bases, including virtual team building for new teams
- Review of transformation programme business cases and activity in context of Covid impact
- Explore options to reduce the impact of digital poverty on remote learning
- On-going review of Local Outbreak Management Plan
- Research and discussions to develop understanding and response to emerging need

Schools – Extending Provision

Key Points

- Schools are now closed to pupils for the summer break. Preparations continue for the planned return to school for all pupils in September, including implementation of Catch-up Grant and National Tutoring Programme for disadvantaged pupils. Weekly LA / School meetings scheduled over the holiday period, with cell to reconvene at end of August
- A number of schools and Special Schools will be offering some summer activity provision, with others offering continued targeted PFSA support over the holiday period
- Potential resource issues for schools in managing blended virtual and face to face curriculum should blended learning still be required in September
- Support available to help schools manage high levels of anxiety for learners, parents and staff in relation to phased return to school
- Public Health providing regular updates on data and guidance
- School transport – planning for September continues, matching bubbles/social distancing/staggered opening times. Temporary increase in budget requested for 3 months from September. Links made with Highways re traffic management and promotion of sustainable travel
- H&S Guidance and risk assessments have been updated and shared via SSE website and bulletin
- Impact of Covid 19 on Early Years Sufficiency being monitored
- Various comms planned from now and throughout school holidays re the positives of returning to school and summer provisions:
 - Heads' 'Welcome Back' video running on Social Media <https://somersexnewsroom.com/2020/07/22/heads-in-somersex-ready-to-welcome-pupils-back/>
 - Press release issued on 16 July signposting parents to holiday provision <https://somersexnewsroom.com/2020/07/16/childcare-provision-available-for-all-ages/>

Successes

- All Somerset schools offered extended provision, with numbers showing continual rise
- Early years attendance number have continued to rise, slight levelling now due to summer holidays
- School leadership appreciative of SCC support during Covid 19 period and on implementing extended provision
- Outdoor curriculum offer developed with partners / agencies with 290 staff trained
- Emergency PPE provided and on-going ordering process established
- Information on holiday activities and Childcare Finder service shared with partners / parents (and published on Somerset Choices Website)

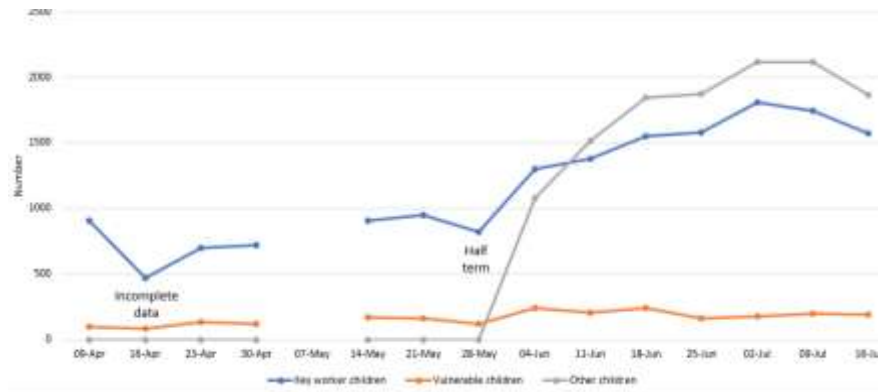
Key Risks

- Staff & family confidence to return to school in September
- School capacity to meet demand
- School transport demand and capacity
- Anticipated increased attainment gap for disadvantaged students
- Anticipated rise in anxiety levels for some staff & children returning to school
- Concerns raised over impact on transition arrangements for September

Actions Going Forward

- Establish impact on school delegated budgets
- The successful link worker arrangement will be continued until October.
- Planning towards extended provision & possible blended offer for September
- Working group to explore opportunities / guidance for catch up grants / National Tutoring Programme
- Comms including press releases planned around free school meals, summer holiday options, partnership work, school transport and the positives of going back to school
- Scenario planning taking place with Public Health and school representation
