Key Messages this week

1. Stronger Somerset Approved at SWT Full Council

Somerset West and Taunton Council has given its overwhelming support to the Stronger Somerset Business Case, which proposes two new unitary Councils and a combined authority.

4. East Street Consultation Underway

SWT is encouraging members of the public to have their say on the effect of temporary changes to traffic flow in Taunton. The current temporary closure of East Street to all vehicles except cycles was initiated as a joint response from SWT and Somerset County Council (SCC) working with the police and other partners, to enable social distancing and encourage walking and cycling in line with the first round of Active Travel funding to support the re-opening of high streets.

The impact in East Street is being monitored and SWT is working with SCC to mitigate concerns already raised such as installing more crossing points with ramps to support those with low mobility, and considering the potential of more dedicated off street parking for blue badge holders near East Street. The consultation will allow SWT to seek wider views on the temporary closure while awaiting the outcome of a bid for Active Travel phase two funding which would enable an extension of the scheme.

The public consultation began on 10 September and will run for two weeks. It asks if people would support an extension of the temporary closure and seeks input on the positives and negatives of having the road closed such as the ability to cross the road safely and cleaner air, against loss of on street parking and the impact on traffic movement around town.

The consultation also asks what changes people would you like to see if the scheme is extended and whether they would like to see activities on the street, for instance market stalls and entertainment.

6. Somerset Waste Partnership Services

Recycle More is the next big leap forward to drive up recycling. It will add new materials to weekly recycling collections: household and food plastic pots, tubs and trays; food and drink cartons; small household batteries; and small electrical items.

With so much more recycled each week, rubbish will be collected every three weeks. Extra advice and support will be available for families using nappies and similar hygiene products.

Recycle More will roll out across the county in phases, starting with all households in Mendip in Phase 1, all household in South Somerset in Phase 2, and all households in Sedgemoor and Somerset West and Taunton in Phases 3 and 4. Somerset County Council (SCC)

Highway Maintenance Update

SCC Highways are currently focusing on the routine tasks of gully emptying, safety defect repairs and patching. As we enter the autumn months, SCC Highways are moving to another phase of highway maintenance. Finished is the grass cutting and the main surface dressing programme, which are works typical of the summer and the warmer weather.

There is one surface dressing task that SCC Highways are now starting and this is preparation for next summer's programme. Readers may have noticed that yellow spray paint has been applied to some roads. This is typically dashed lines with numbers. This is to mark up the pre-patching that is an important part of any surface dressing programme. Doing the work now will allow the patch to settle it, especially as regards the bituminous oils on the surface. Having this worn off by traffic or weather for a few months will help prevent bleeding through the new dressings when they are laid in the summer. Working at this time of year will also assist with co-ordination of road works on the network and minimise disruption for road users.

M5 Junction 25 Improvement Scheme

Toneway/J25 Gyrotory

The final surfacing works on the Toneway will be undertaken during overnight road closures starting on the 21 September. This work will run alongside the final surfacing of the gyrotory also starting on the 21 September at the M5 north bound off slip road. Following the final surfacing, the traffic management will resemble the pre-construction layout until the new link road is completed.

Work will continue with the installation of the new traffic light system along with the new pedestrian cycle route within the inner gyrotory.

Blue Anchor coast and road protection

Somerset County Council is preparing to fund a West Somerset coastal defence that will help protect a key road at Blue Anchor. The investment of up to £4m is being funded through a Government highways grant and will enable rock armour to be installed at the foot of eroding cliffs to protect the road; and will also benefit nearby properties. The cliffs will also be re-profiled to stop future slippage and stabilised with coir mesh and turf.

The County Council is working with Somerset West and Taunton Council - the Coastal Protection Authority - to deliver and maintain the rock armour.

The decision is being considered following a consultants' feasibility study, commissioned by Somerset County Council, looking into the best ways to protect the B3191.

The stretch of coast at Blue Anchor has a long history of erosion and the two councils are working with the Environment Agency (EA) to identify and address the issues.

Some large voids were discovered behind the sea wall immediately in front of the Blue Anchor Hotel in June 2020. SWT began emergency works and the first phase was completed in July 2020. This involved filling the voids to stabilise the wall and reduce the risk of collapse.

A second phase of work is planned to start this autumn and will involve placing rock armour to protect the wall and cliffs from wave action. These two phases of work, funded by Flood Defence Grant in Aid from the Environment Agency, will be incorporated into the design of a comprehensive permanent scheme to protect the road which will aim to commence construction next year.

Somerset Community Foundation

Somerset Coronavirus Appeal

Somerset Community Foundation launched the Coronavirus Appeal in late March 2020 to raise vital funds to help our communities through this difficult time. So far, thanks to donations and support from the [National Emergencies Trust](#), **£1 million** has been raised. This funding has provided more than [180 grants](#) to local charitable groups to help them respond to urgent need. Donations have provided food, medicine, counselling, emotional support and housing to name but a few.

Demand for housing support service in West Somerset continues to increase

A recent survey has suggested that since the coronavirus pandemic started, more than 170,000 private tenants have been threatened with eviction by their landlord or letting agent, and an estimated 230,000 renters in England have fallen into arrears [*source: [Shelter](#)*].

Local charity, [West Somerset Advice](#), fear that this will increase when the Government lifts the ban on evicting tenants. Based in Minehead and delivering their service across West Somerset, West Somerset Advice runs a housing advocacy project which was set up in response to increasing demand for housing advice. In 2018 they were awarded a 3-year grant for £108,923 from the Hinkley Point C (HPC) Community Fund, administered by Somerset Community Foundation (SCF).

In the last year, West Somerset Advice has provided specialist housing advice and support to 709 people in communities in West Somerset, with an additional 600 family members also benefiting. In the last 12 months the charity has seen an increase of more than 150% of welfare cases related to the affordability of renting. The HPC Community Fund is part of a wider £20 million commitment of funding, provided by EDF through Section 106 agreements, for communities that are affected by the development of the new nuclear power station, to promote their social, economic and environmental wellbeing and enhance their quality of life.

Some of the most recent organisations to be awarded a grant from the HPC Community Fund are:

- **Quantock Hills AONB: Somerset Nature Connections**
A contribution to a partnership project working across Somerset to connect individuals with poor mental health to local green spaces through short courses, work with community groups and training for professionals (grant award refers to work in Sedgemoor and Somerset West & Taunton only)
- **ATWEST (Accessible Transport West Somerset):** A new minibus for ATWEST community transport. Contribution to purchase a new minibus to facilitate work with care homes, a travel service and a new shopping route
- **Stogursey Parochial Church Council:** Stolford and Wick Community Hub To make alterations to St Peter's Church, Stolford to enable it to expand its community use for the area
- **Bishops Hull Hub Ltd:** Bishops Hull Hub
To pay for solar panels for a new build community hub on the outskirts of Taunton

Government Gear Change

Central Government has released an updated Cycling and Walking Plan and promise a review of the Highway Code to improve the safety of cyclists, pedestrians and horse riders. Some of the alterations to the Highway Code will include clearer guidance on cyclist priority at junctions and establishing guidance on safe passing distances and speeds when overtaking cyclists and horse riders.

Health and Welfare

New Government Announcement: - Hands Face Space

The Government has announced new measures to suppress the virus and keep the number of infections down.

There are three simple actions we must all do to keep on protecting each other:

1. Wash hands - keep washing your hands regularly for more than 20 seconds each time
2. Cover face - wear a face covering in enclosed spaces
3. Make space - stay at least two metres apart, or 1 metre with a face covering or other precautions

'Rule of 6'

From Monday 14 September, you must not meet with people from other households socially in groups of more than 6. This will apply indoors and outdoors, including in private homes.

There will be a limited number of exemptions. COVID-19 Secure venues, such as places of worship, restaurants and hospitality venues, can still host larger numbers in total but groups of up to 6 must not mix or form larger groups.

'The Rule of Six' will not apply to individual households or support bubbles of more than 6 who will still be able to gather together. Education and work settings are unaffected, and organised team sports will still be able to proceed, as will weddings and funerals up to 30. From Monday, this limit will be enforceable in law.

Travel restrictions

The guidance for travelling abroad remains the same but further Government restrictions now apply to Portugal, Hungary, French Polynesia, Réunion and some of the Greek Islands (Crete, Lesbos, Mykonos, Santorini, Serifos, Tinos and Zakynthos), they have now been removed from the travel corridors list.

If you arrive in England, Wales, Scotland or Northern Ireland from any country not on the travel corridor exemption list you will need to self-isolate.

As a result:

- People already in Portugal, Hungary, French Polynesia, Réunion, Crete, Lesbos, Mykonos, Santorini, Serifos, Tinos and Zakynthos can stay for the remainder of their holiday and will have to self-isolate upon return for 2 weeks
- Advice against all but essential travel to countries that are not on the travel corridors list

Beat Helpline Demand Soars

Beat is the UK's eating disorder charity, providing information and support 365 days a year through helplines which people can call, text or email, and through online support including information, message boards and online support groups.

Beat has reported demand for its Helpline services in the past six months has increased by 97% compared to the same period last year. The pandemic has had an unprecedented impact on those affected by an eating disorder, with 28% of people reaching out to the Helpline from May - July 2020 linking coronavirus as the possible trigger for relapsing or developing symptoms.

Beat estimates around 1.25 million people in the UK have an eating disorder - which includes anorexia, bulimia and binge-eating. The challenges of lockdown and feeling "out of control" during the pandemic are a "perfect storm" for people with eating disorders.

World Suicide Prevention

To address World Suicide Prevention day (10 September) Somerset Suicide Prevention Partnership Group is wanting to train 100 local people in suicide awareness.

Suicide can affect anybody and there isn't a community in Somerset where people haven't been touched by suicide. 'Suicide Let's Talk' is a **20-minute free course** and is for anyone in Somerset who has an interest in learning more about suicide and gaining lifesaving skills and knowledge.

A single phone number is available for anyone in Somerset who needs coronavirus-related support from their councils. The **0300 790 6275** number is available seven days per week 8am - 6pm.

Anyone who can't find help within their own local networks and volunteers, can use this number to get help and advice around:

- Personal care and support including food and delivery of prescriptions
- Support for the homeless
- Emotional support if you're feeling worried or anxious
- Transport to medical appointments
- Waste collection and disposal
- Financial support

Spot “County Lines” and stop the crime and the exploitation

Somerset communities are urged to know the signs of ‘County Lines’ in a bid to stop illegal drug related criminal activity operating in their area. A new campaign has been launched by the Safer Somerset Partnership and it sets out what County Lines are, the signs to look out for and how to contact [Crimestoppers](#) if you believe County Lines are operating in your area.

County Lines is a term used to describe gangs and organised criminal networks who export illegal drugs from one area (usually a city) into another (usually a more rural county) within the UK by using dedicated mobile phone lines or another form of “deal line”.

The criminal gangs often exploit children and vulnerable adults to move and store drugs and money, and will often use coercion, intimidation, violence (including sexual violence) and weapons.

Watch out for coronavirus ‘test and trace’ scam

Trading Standards in Somerset are warning residents to be aware of scammers looking to exploit the NHS Test and Trace service. NHS Test and Trace is a

Government system to reduce the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19). It works through quickly testing people with symptoms and phoning, texting or emailing whoever they have had close contact with to tell them to isolate for 14 days. It is a free service.

There are concerns that some people, particularly the vulnerable or elderly, could be susceptible to fake calls or messages from criminals looking to get access to personal information or trick them into handing over money.
